RECTOR'S LETTER MARCH 2016

One of the interesting things about Easter is that it moves about. To many this is frustrating, not least for schools and their holidays. But to me it is great as it shows that the power of Easter is not tamed. Christmas has been fixed as one date, 25th December, yet it too slowly moves through the week a day at a time, in a very predictable way. Such that it has almost be over taken by secular society, people know when it is, if not what it is truly all about. With Easter people neither know when it is, let alone what it is and so it evades the onset of consumerism.

Easter reminds us of a defining moment in world history and understanding. For many we focus rightly on Easter being the day that Jesus rose from the dead. Yet this in some ways is only a small physical miracle. If all Easter contained was the story of a body being resuscitated, it would be no great deal. But Easter is far more than that. Jesus' resurrection was a fantastic thing that changed the world. But he didn't just come back from death to die again in a physical sense. His earthly resurrected presence showed the reality of there being life after the end of our physical life here on earth. Sure, he came and shared some of our world again in a physical way. He ate and slept and talked with many people, but if that was all then he might have touched a few hundred or thousand of lives before he died again.

Yet Jesus didn't die again, he is alive as much today as that first Easter day. Not with us in this physical world, but in the spiritual world, in a place referred to by many as Heaven. However we are not alone and left behind, for he sent the Holy Spirit to be with us, to be a continuing reminder, if we need it, of this promised new life. A life that brings light and hope into the dark places; a life that walks beside us and with us through our journey of life. A life that changed the way the world can see God, a life that cannot be neither tamed nor contained. There is an advert which says 'why have velvet when you can have silk,' I say why have bunnies when you can have the real thing!

Chris Wragg and Mike Hunt from Northamptonshire County Council (NCC) attended the February Parish Council meeting to discuss the results of the bypass survey. Details of the discussion can be found in the minutes of the meeting, posted on Farthinghoe Parish Council website. The final actions from the discussion were a) for NCC to provide a full written explanation of why it isn't possible to impose a weight restriction on Main Road and b) for the Parish Council to prepare a considered response from the Parish to the bypass proposal.

The headline results of the survey were:

- 90 people attended the exhibition on Friday 4th December 2015
- 50 people attended the exhibition on Saturday 5th December 2015
- 165 questionnaires were returned, of which 106 were by post and 59 on-line
- 126 responses were from village residents or properties adjacent to the village
- 39 were from non-village residents
- 125 consider a bypass is required
- 37 consider a bypass is not required
- 3 were unsure
- 92 prefer a northern bypass
- 38 prefer a southern bypass
- 35 had no preference

Road Harm

In the summer of 2015 the Police and Crime Commissioner, Adam Simmonds, visited 100 different villages and parishes across Northamptonshire and the number one concern raised throughout conversations with residents was road related problems.

To help tackle this issue, Adam has recently announced the launch of a brand new service for victims; *Voice:* Road Harm.

The new service offers support for victims of serious road traffic collisions, an area which the Victims Code until recently did not support. Voice; Road Harm will give support to both victims and their families who have suffered distressing road-related trauma, such as face-to-face therapy, and a telephone helpline offering emotional and practical support.

Talking about the new service, Adam said: "Putting victims at the heart of the criminal justice system has been one of my main aims since being voted in to office and I'm delighted that we can offer further specialist support to victims with the launch of Voice: Road Harm. With the creation of the Voice: Road Harm service we have significantly improved the support we are able to offer victims, witnesses and those affected by crime, and Voice: Road Harm is another strand to this that will see people receive a better standard of care when they need it. Too often road victims have been ignored and this service aims to address this imbalance"

The key objectives of Voice; Road Harm is to ensure that all victims and witnesses of serious road traffic collisions receive a service that is tailored to their needs and preferences; that they receive appropriate information, advice and support to enable them to cope, recover and thrive; are treated in a respectful, sensitive, professional and non-discriminatory manner; and are supported, where appropriate, through their participation in criminal proceedings.


