

CHURCH UPDATE

It was great to see all those who attended the Christmas services especially the Crib Service on Christmas Eve where the crib was 'assembled'.

The Rector position is being advertised again this month. As a deanery we now have a new Rural Dean - Revd Matthew Robinson who will help support us during this interregnum.

Our service pattern continues, with a 9.30am service on the 2nd Sunday and on the 4th Sunday of each month with the Benefice Services around the five churches. Dates of all the services are on the church notice board.

Thank you to everyone who keeps the church looking so lovely, those who provide flowers and those who decorated the church so beautifully for Christmas - and our Ministry team who are working extra hard during this time without a Rector.

Did you know?

- January includes a number of Saints' Days including St Kentigern/Mungo (13th), St Wulfstan (19th) and St. Agnes (21st).
- Closest to home was St. Wulfstan who was born in Long Itchington, Warwickshire, in about 1008.
- He went on to become Bishop of Worcester and gained the dubious distinction of being the longest surviving pre-conquest Bishop when he died in Worcester in 1095.
- During his tenure as Bishop he founded Great Malvern Priory and initiated large scale ecclesiastical building works including at Worcester and Hereford Cathedrals.
- Wulfstan was canonised in 1203 by Pope Innocent III.
- Perhaps appropriately for this time of year, he is the Patron Saint of dieters and vegetarians.



To All Farthinghoe and Steane Residents

Following on from the Bypass news posted in the December edition of the Farthinghoe Chronicle...

We have now received news of a routine traffic data census which was carried out throughout October on the A422 adjacent to the turning into Middleton Cheney.

This survey was carried out on a 24/7 basis.

It will produce a daily average of vehicles based on 5 days per week (Monday to Friday) and a 7 days per week average (Monday to Sunday).

The figures will be based on total vehicle throughput and will also have a separate analysis based on a number of vehicle types.

This survey was conducted before the announcement of work beginning again to prepare a new Farthinghoe bypass business plan.

These figures will be confirmed and made available to us early in January.

In the week ending 9/12/2022 we noticed that new Highway Data Analysis tube equipment has been installed at the following locations:

- On the Farthinghoe bound carriageway of the A422 at the Brackley West roundabout
- On the A422 adjacent to the entrance to the Recycling Centre
- On the Cockley Road outside of the village
- On the Charlton Road at the entry to the wood

Six CCTV traffic analysis cameras were also installed for 3 days in the week ending 9/12/2022 as follows:

- Three at the School Traffic Light Crossing
- One in the entry road to Steane Park
- Two on the A422 between New Road and the Recycling Centre

We will keep you informed as and when we learn more

STAGECOACH BUS SERVICES

The Parish Council have received the following from STAGECOACH:

From Sunday 1st January 2023, the cost of a single bus journey will be <u>capped at f_2^* </u> on most Stagecoach routes in England.

The Bus Fare Cap scheme is a Government initiative which <u>will run</u> <u>from 1st January until 31st March 2023</u>. During this time, most single fares on eligible Stagecoach routes will cost $\pounds, 2$ or less.

Tickets can be bought on board or on the <u>Stagecoach Bus App</u>. *Ts&Cs apply, including exclusions on certain routes.

WASSAILING THE TREE!

Waes hael: an Anglo-Saxon phrase variously translated as *be well* or *be in good health*. The phrase to be *hale and hearty* has a common origin.

The short, dark days of January can seem as bleak to us as they no doubt did to our predecessors who, greatly to their credit, came up with one way of beating those January blues in the form of a social gathering involving a suitably warming drink or two – originally at the expense of the feudal Lord as a means of demonstrating seasonal goodwill.

In rural areas, particularly those with a tradition of growing apple trees for cider-making such as Herefordshire, Somerset and Devon, the ceremony is effectively a form of blessing of the trees and has ancient roots believed to encourage the fertility of the orchard and thus increase the yield of apples.

The Wassailers, often with appropriately costumed characters such as the Wassail King and Queen, assemble around the trees offering up a piece of toast soaked in the Wassail cup as a gift to the tree spirits.

To tempt these arboreal spirits, and to drive away any evil demons, the Wassailers make as much noise as possible by shouting, banging pots and even firing shotguns into the air around the trees. This cacophonous din is however tempered with a variety of rather more melodious song and verse, no doubt intended to placate the benign spirits as much as for the Wassailers to enjoy.

The Wassail is held on Twelfth Night which, in the Christian calendar is now fixed as 5th January; although, there are many practitioners who resolutely observe 17th January as was the case before the adoption of the Gregorian Calender in 1752.

Wassail bowls or cups are traditionally fashioned from turned wood in various sizes and degrees of sophistication. There are some surviving examples fashioned from exotic hardwoods such as *Lignum vitae* (literally Tree of Life) as well as native hardwoods.

Q. What's ailing the tree?

DAVE HANCOCK – AN APPRECIATION

Born in Weymouth into a seafaring family, Dave arrived in London Barn, Farthinghoe some forty years ago and made our village, so remote from the nearest coastline, his home. He married Wendy in our church and they would have been together for 29 years in February.

His first job as a mechanic ignited a lifelong interest in motorised transport and tools (someone who insists on taking a cement mixer on holiday could be regarded as obsessive), resulting in a collection of both, including his beloved Mercedes and motorbike whose restoration - following an 'incident'- has been passed to Rob Healey.

Dave, was very much a communicator, a 'people-person', and spent much of his professional life as a senior manager for BT, involved in education and training: something he cared passionately about.

Having retired, Dave reinvented himself with an alter ego – that caped crusader *Handy Hancock* – and immersed himself into an array of practical projects around the village, only some of which involved trips to Accident and Emergency. Dave could turn his hand to anything and delighted in acquiring new knowledge and technical expertise. His sage advice, as well as his practical skills, will be fondly remembered and sorely missed.

The village was very much home to Dave and he threw himself wholeheartedly into it, not just as Handy Hancock, but also in his service on the Parish Council, as Chair of the Village Hall Committee and as a member of The Fox's Aunt Sally team. Dave was instrumental in providing us with a Village Hall to be proud of and also in the erection of the Village Beacon.

Above all, Dave valued family and friends. He was someone who always made time to chat – preferably over a pint of ale – and had a knack of making problems seem both manageable and solvable.

A much loved husband, father, grandfather and friend.

The following has been sent to Farthinghoe School who wish to share it with us all:

4th January 2023

Dear Parents and Guardians,

As your child returns to school after the festive break, it is important you are aware that there remains a risk of winter infections. You may have seen or heard that Flu, COVID-19, and Scarlet Fever are continuing to circulate, and as a result there is an increased risk of infection amongst the school community.

Professor Susan Hopkins, the Chief Medical Adviser at the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) has issued the following advice to help protect your child and others they are in contact with:

- If your child is unwell and has a fever, you are advised to keep them at home until the fever has passed and they feel better. During this time your child should avoid attending school, nursery, childminder or having contact with any other person outside the household.
- An adult who is unwell should also try to stay at home and avoid seeing others.
- If a person is unwell and they have to go out, they are advised to avoid attending a healthcare setting, such as a GP surgery or hospital, unless calling first. Also do not attend a high-risk setting such as a care home or nursing home.
- If a person needs to leave the house whilst they are unwell, UKHSA recommends a face covering is worn at all times to help avoid passing their infection to others.
- Good hand hygiene continues to be important to avoid spreading infections through touch. You are asked to encourage your child to regularly wash their hands, with soap and warm water.
- Vaccination is the best protection against any avoidable illness such as Flu or COVID-19. You are advised to ensure your child is vaccinated when they are invited.
