**To All Farthinghoe and Steane Residents** 

During October a letter from Dame Andrea Leadsom MP was posted to residents in the Parish, this letter concerned the alleviation of traffic problems occurring at the Pinch Point.

This Parish Council does not, and never have considered our traffic problem in this way.

It is about the need for a village bypass with the possibility of an interim Weight Restriction whilst planning, funding and building a bypass can take place.

With regard to paragraph 4 of Dame Andrea's letter we have to add that at the 1 September meeting mentioned, we had requested WNC Highways to provide a full explanation of how the Methodology for these calculations worked in this specific instance and we had subsequently confirmed this request in writing.

It is now close to the end of November and we still await news on this and all of the other issues raised.

We have evidence from other Parishes in South Northants that letters like Lynne's to support of Parish Councils have been very productive.

Should any other residents feel as strongly as Lynne does then we recommend them to follow suit and to respond directly to Dame Andrea Leadsom MP because it is important for her to know directly.

Re : Proposed Farthinghoe Bypass

Dear Dame Leadsom,

I arrived in Farthinghoe in 2019, along with my husband, following twenty years of living abroad.

We were delighted to have chosen an ancient and beautiful village, surrounded by glorious countryside. We were not so happy once we realised how much the negative impact of the A422 that runs through the village would affect our daily lives, as it affects the lives of all who live here.

Initially, we were informed by our neighbours that the people of Farthinghoe had been assured that a Bypass would be in situ by 2025. We enquired, by whom had this assurance been given? The answer? By your good self, our local MP. We asked ourselves what has taken place since that long ago village meeting to further the progress of the Farthinghoe Bypass? The answer? Precisely nothing. In fact I am given to understand that precisely nothing has been achieved during the thirty-five years since the 'fight' for the Farthinghoe Bypass began.

This is an outrageous and ridiculous situation; and I fail to comprehend why despite all of the hard work carried out by our parish Council, this village continues to be denied a much needed Bypass. In an article penned by the Chair of our Parish Council Mick Morris, published in the Banbury Guardian on November 7<sup>th</sup> 2023, it appears that there is no coherent explanation as to why nothing has been processed to further the construction of a Bypass. In addition I understand that monies amounting to £36 billion saved by abandoning the HS2 Northern route – are to be allocated to the A43 duality project between Northampton and Kettering, and to the A509 Isham Bypass. Nothing apparently to South Northants and certainly nothing towards the Farthinghoe Bypass.

I am also informed that you commented that fifty years of demands for the Farthinghoe Bypass have not been met due to the 'tricky' road layout in the village. I can assure you that here in Farthinghoe, we are only too well aware of the 'tricky' road layout. Hardly a day goes by without multiple incidents of huge HGVs becoming stuck on the so called 'pinch point' causing danger and chaos, as irritated drivers speed through the narrow lanes of the village in order to beat the resulting traffic jam.

In your recent letter sent to all Farthinghoe residents, you indicated that The Department of Transport have decreed that Farthinghoe is well below their 'score' for allocating funds for a Bypass. This should not be about 'scores' it should be about the quality of peoples' lives – people whose lives are affected daily by the A422, and about the hazards and dangers that we all face. Not least by our village school and by our church, as parents, children and churchgoers have to cope with the difficulties that occur when attempting to cross the road. Drivers are often impatient when meeting the traffic lights; do not adhere to the speed limit, and on more than one occasion I have been nearly run down when they have decided that they didn't want to wait for the 'green light'.

You stated that the decision taken by the Department of Transport is 'disappointing'; that we face 'challenges' due to the 'pinch point' and that you will 'work hard' to find an alternative solution to a Bypass. I would say that 'disappointing' is somewhat of an understatement, that we do not want an 'alternative' that we want and desperately need a Bypass. This situation should not be allowed to continue for any longer than is humanly possible, and I would therefore urge you in the strongest terms, to work as hard and as speedily as you can, to put an end to it. The people of Farthinghoe need a firm assurance that in future they will be able to live safely and without the concerns and fears that the A422 has inflicted upon this village for so many years.

### JOYEUX NOEL

As I look forward to Christmas, and begin to immerse myself in preparations; I find myself looking back to other Christmases – in another land – France – and I recall how different the celebrations are in our two countries.

I adore Christmas, and when we moved to Normandy I wondered how different the traditions and festivities would be from what we were used to in England. The answer to my query was: very different, but nonetheless, very enjoyable. The French love any excuse to celebrate and make the most of every festival, something we found such a pleasure during our many years of living there.

In Normandy, you will not see a single Christmas decoration, tree, or any lights anywhere until December  $1^{st}$ . The same goes for the shops, Christmas gifts, toys etc are not put on display prior to that date. We found that refreshing – being used to seeing – and being irritated by – a plethora of Christmas paraphernalia shortly after the August Bank holiday. But on December  $1^{st}$  Christmas explodes into each town and village – fairy lights festooned all around, Christmas trees in the streets and lanes and cribs outside the churches. In the shops all the wonderful chocolates and confectionery and enticing gifts appear. The French don't exchange Christmas cards, they send out New Year (Bonne Annee) cards; but all of our French friends loved to receive our English Christmas cards – the more Robins and sparkle the better !

The main festive meal is eaten on Christmas Eve; nowhere will a Restaurant or Cafe be found open on that day as everyone gets together with their families. Only the Bakeries remain open – French Law states that bread must be available on every day of the yearand the Butcher's shops – until lunchtime. Mostly Goose or Duck will be served but occasionally Turkey. I recall standing in our local Butcher's shop one Christmas Eve to collect our Turkey. The shop was crowded, everyone chatting and laughing as is customary and our Butcher asked me what I would serve with the Turkey, did I make a 'farci' (stuffing) 'Oh yes' I said and proceeded to describe good old sage & onion with sausage meat. Howls of laughter from the French and "Eeergh'. And what sauces did we have with the meal? 'Oh bread sauce and cranberry sauce – and gravy'. 'What's Gravy'? I told him and again shrieks of laughter and cries of 'pain??' (bread ) and 'cerise??' (cranberry) Eerrgh ! Did we have 'Escargots'? (snails) 'Non Non Non'! I cried followed by 'Eeergh' and we were all by then howling with laughter, as I left with our Turkey to a chorus of 'Bon Noel Madame'.

A Carol Service has always been a part of Christmas for us and, I had thought that it was a pity that now living in France we would not be able to attend one. I had reckoned without our Local Priest, a delightful man, the Abbe Cerveux who summoned 'all you Brits' to come and sing English Carols in his Church. We duly turned up with a small crowd of ex-pats and were ordered 'don't sit at the back you lot, just because we beat you at Rugby'. We did as we were told and were soon lustily singing our favourite Carols to the congregation. Along with French Carols, which I am sorry to say are rather gloomy. As always it finished with 'Jingle Bells' which all French children know and love.

The French don't have crackers. Don't understand the concept at all. So on Christmas afternoon after lunch when we, along with our visiting family, did our usual walk around the village with our dogs – wearing paper hats – we were met with much amusement and bemused looks. 'Quoi'? (what??) I explained the custom. 'Oh les Anglais, heula!' (Oh the English – blimey !!)

We spent many Christmases in rural Normandy and enjoyed them all – revelling in the differences between our two cultures. Now, back home in England we once more celebrate all of the age old traditions with joy, but look back with pleasure at the ones we learned in France, and we are sure that our French friends enjoyed a few of ours.


