

RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS – SEPTEMBER 2018

Our Harvest services will begin with a quote from scripture "As long as the earth endures, seed-time and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, will never cease." Genesis 9.22 This promise comes just after the explanation of creation and God's promise not to wipe human kind from the face of the earth. It sets the scene for our harvest thanksgiving, and those who help to produce it for us.

It also reminds us that everything we have comes from God. The farmer plants the seed and also harvests the grain, but they cannot make a seed grow, that is God's gift of life. Harvest is about giving thanks for God's gifts. For generations, even back to biblical times, people have brought harvest gifts to show their thankfulness. Yet this year the harvest has not been easy for many. The long hot summer helps some crops but not others. The wild fires have destroyed other crops and livelihoods, flash floods and broken dams have left others washed out. The micro plastics in our oceans are being digested by the fish we eat. All is not rosy and yet all is not lost either.

The change in our climate is becoming harder to deny and many would say that we are coming to a tipping point. If things get only a little bit warmer, then the climate will run away on a warmer course and there will be nothing we can do about it. So maybe now is the time to decide to make a difference. The church of England has a strategy to reduce its energy footprint and its effect on our planets ecology, so what are we doing as individuals and as community? There is much good advice about the subject if we want to read and act on it.

Yet those who are being most hurt by these changes are those who can least afford the suffering. Many third world producers struggle to survive let along make a profit or plan for the future. And if the weather changes were not enough to cope with, then Brexit rears its head. As we prepare to leave the EU then so we prepare to leave the fair trade deals with many countries that have taken years of hard work to put in place. As our negotiators argue for the best deal for the UK as is their directive, I would want them also to negotiate for fair trade deals with our third world producers as well. Just look at our food cupboards and see how much is home grown and how much we import.

The world is created for everybody and there is enough for everybody, and I would argue it is everybody's responsibility to care for this creation, this planet we live on. May we take the opportunity that harvest gives us to focus our thoughts on the world and the food it produces and those who produce it for us to eat. May we look back with thanks and also look forward with hope and determination to do our part as stewards of creation to help ensure the seed time and harvest for future generations and peoples.

A brief update on an incident involving an HGV which occurred at the pedestrian crossing. Cllr Grant wrote to and pursued the company concerned and we have been informed that the driver was sent on additional training as a result of the incident but has since left the company.

In her report at the Annual Parish Meeting, Cllr Breese mentioned the "Home Safe" scheme. This is offered by Care & Repair (Northamptonshire) Ltd to provide a range of practical services to support older, disabled and vulnerable people. The Handyperson service offers a range of small home improvements at a low cost and can be contacted on 01604 782250, e-mail office@care-and-repair.org.uk, www.care-and-repair.org.uk. Examples of the jobs they will do include fixing of curtain rails, hanging curtains, fitting shelves, fixing gates and doors and replacing locks. They can also advise on other services available, such as energy saving solutions to keep homes warm.

CLOSURE OF THE A422

Mick Morris, Chairman of Farthinghoe Parish Council writes:

We were all taken by surprise by the speed of closure of the A422 & none more so than NCC Highways it seems. The professionalism of their traffic management arrangements has left a lot to be desired as we have all experienced. Things have quietened down a lot now but there are still things to be done.

Cockley Road is now the main concern—We have requested that temporary speed limits are put in place (20 mph within the village confines & 40 mph outside. Parking on Cockley Road within the village limits has to be addressed & we have asked for this to be done.

School starts back on 6th September & we are very concerned by the lack of action by NCC, despite constant reminders

Some road resurfacing has taken place on Cockley Road, but much more is needed & to a much better standard.

During the first week of closure we have had to be constantly in touch with NCC highlighting the shortcomings of the signage & asking for changes.

These changes included specific & more clear signage to stop HGVs using the A422 & at our request Digital Signage was put at the A422/A43 junction & the A422/M40 Junction, although even this digital signage had to be subsequently adjusted to be more apparent.

Improved signage had also been requested for the Barley Mow roundabout (A421/A43), for the Brackley West roundabout, for the Cockley Road/Welsh Lane diversion route + miscellaneous signage within the village.

During the first chaotic day of the road closure we had requested Police attendance to help control a developing situation which was in danger of escalating out of control with tempers fraying. Their solution of reporting this to Street Doctor did not seem, in our eyes, to be a suitable & proportionate response.

Following the old maxim of "no gain without pain" then for the time being please enjoy the heaven of our village without the constant A422 traffic.

Practice in preparation for the future we hope!
