

500 BUS SERVICE UPDATE

Some positive news concerning our bus service (extracted from BANBURY GUARDIAN 27th September 2022):

Stagecoach West today (Monday) announced the reinstatement of a Sunday and Public Holiday service between Brackley, Middleton Cheney and Banbury. It was removed at the end of August. The route on Service 500 will resume from Sunday, October 16.

The returning hourly service will be financially supported by Oxfordshire County Council with a contribution from West Northamptonshire Council, on an initial agreement until August 2024.

Rachel Geliamassi, Managing Director, Stagecoach West said: "Our top priority is to provide a sustainable service enabling reliable travel for work, leisure and health appointments. However, on occasion, there are days of the week when we are unable to balance the revenue and the increased costs of operating the route.

"We are delighted that we have been able to find a solution to reinstate an hourly Sunday and Public Holiday service on the 500 thanks to financial support from both Oxfordshire County Council and West Northamptonshire Council. We encourage more people to consider using the bus for their trips to Banbury at weekends so the service continues to grow, sustaining it for the future."

It's time to apply for your child's school place for September 2023

Parents and carers can now apply for a reception place in a primary or infant school, a year 3 place in a junior school, or a Year 7 place in a secondary school for the September 2023 intake.

Parents and carers will be able to apply up until 12 midnight on the closing dates for both Primary and Secondary applications, making the process easier and fairer for families.

Parents and carers can apply for a place in reception if their child will be four years of age on or before 31 August 2023.

The closing date for applications for places in reception and year 3 (junior school) is **15 January 2023 at midnight**.

The closing date for applications for Year 7 places is 31 October 2022 at midnight.

All applications, whether postal or online, must be received by the closing date to be considered as on time.

Late applications will not be processed until after the National Offer Day and will be processed in monthly rounds.

All on time applicants will receive an offer of a school place on the National Offer Days -1 March 2023 for secondary places and 17 April 2023 for reception places.

Applicants will then be provided with information on the next stage of the process.

There is a separate application process for children who have special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan, details of which can be found on the **SEND admissions** page.

Cllr Fiona Baker, West Northants Council's Cabinet member for children, families and education, said: "I would encourage families who are applying for a school place for September 2023 to utilise the support and advice available on our website.

"We hope that the time extension to midnight means that it will be easier for families to submit their application before the deadline, giving them the best chance of getting a place at their preferred school and avoiding any disappointment."

An independent <u>admission appeals process</u> is available for families who wish to appeal against refusal of a place at any school for which they have applied. FORAGING FARTHINGHOE: CRAB AND WILDING APPLES

Walk, cycle or drive out of the village, along Cockley Road for example, and you can't fail to spot the apple trees amongst the native hedging.

Crab apples (Malus sylvestris) are ancestrally related to cultivated/orchard apples (Malus domestica) and have themselves been cultivated into ornamental forms with bountiful blossom in spring and fabulous fruits in autumn.

Apples are highly promiscuous plants and don't come true from seed (which perhaps explains their association with love and fertility).

Many of our roadside apple trees are actually 'wildings' rather than true crab apples and may result from cross pollination between crab and orchard apple species or be orchard apple seeds that have been deposited in the hedgerows.

Crab apples (wild or ornamental) are high in pectin, making them particularly useful for things like crab apple jelly, fruit leather and as a natural setting agent for a variety of jams.

They make the basis of some particularly fine infusions and country wines as well as being a cider-making ingredient.

The fruits can also be roasted to accompany other dishes such as roast pork and even bubbled away whole in a shallow pan of butter and brown sugar to make an indulgent, warming dessert (with perhaps a splash of rum or brandy towards the end and some cream/crème fraîche to serve).

Wildings are especially attractive to cider and country wine makers as they can offer something unique. It's just a matter of trying the fruits from the trees you come across. Some as sweet as named cultivars and others sharper.

RECIPE IDEAS:

CRAB APPLE VODKA

Making cider or wine at home requires significant investment both in time and specialist ingerdients/equipment.

An infusion, on the other hand, is a much simpler way to enjoy your foraged fruit. In fact, cleaned and sterilised jars are the only equipment required (Kilner-type jars are ideal).

For each 500ml of Vodka you will need:

- About 250g of small crab apples
- About 130g sugar feel free to experiment with type, but bog-standard caster or granulated is just fine.

Simply put the crab apples and sugar into the jar and top up with vodka.

Keep the apples submerged using scrunched up kitchen foil, close the lid and put in a dark place for the magic to happen. Shake daily until the sugar has dissolved, and leave as long as you can resist (but no more than 6 months), before straining your infusion into bottles.

In a perfect world, you would leave the bottles for a year or two before drinking...

WILD FARTHINGHOE - THE GOLDCREST (Regulus regulus)



On an otherwise calm September day, the 6ft high stems of our bronze fennel plant suddenly began swaying and shaking in violent animation. A tornado perhaps? Thankfully not - to our amazement we counted 6 tiny, squabbling Goldcrests flitting from stem to stem.

Having been puzzled by our fennel seeds disappearing all summer, we thought we had found the explanation. Alas not! It appears that Goldcrests are insectivores with a penchant for spiders, aphids, caterpillars, flies and insect eggs. They will even harvest insects trapped in spider webs - potentially giving them a bonus arachnid as well.

Goldcrests and the closely related Firecrest are our smallest bird, weighing a mere 6g (compared to the Wren's positively portly 7-12g).

Goldcrests are actually far more common than you might think, although not as numerous as the Wren (our commonest breeding bird).

They are said to prefer coniferous woodlands to broadleaf and their sharp beaks are adapted to winkling out small insects from pine cones.
