## Pastoral Letter – October 2020

Dear Friends, as I write this letter, the weather has been glorious as summer turns into autumn. I love everything about this time of year, don't you? Especially the resplendent display that our fields and lanes provide us with. The fields have been harvested and lay neatly ploughed, and the trees and hedgerows transform and glow into a golden riot of colour. It even feels great to get the Jeans and boots out again whilst still enjoying warm Autumn Sunshine. The only thing I am not enjoying are the spiders as they make their way indoors!!!

The whole scene makes me want to jump for joy and say "Thank you God for all this goodness".

In our Churches we have been celebrating Harvest festival. This annual celebration is our way of saying "Thank you God for all this goodness". We thank God for the earth, the seed, the rain, and the sun; and we also thank God for the Farmers, Fishermen, industries, suppliers, retailers, and the workers that make up the food Chain. Although Harvest Festival is an annual celebration, this year it has felt even more important to say thank you. But seeing as we have all been able to reflect on our fragile place in the world this year due to the unexpected chaos that Coronavirus pandemic has wrought worldwide, Harvest is a good time to say "Thank you God for all this goodness". He is still providing for our needs, he is still providing seed for the sower, and rain and sun to make it grow. Thank you God.

## Important news from Copse Lodge Action Group

The current proposal to build a **321-acre solar farm** on land between Farthinghoe, Halse and Greatworth was mentioned in the Farthinghoe Chronicle in August & this will known as *Copse Lodge Solar Farm*. South Northamptonshire Council have now required the company behind this proposal, JBM Solar, to undertake an Environmental Impact Assessment.

This was the outcome of Planning Application: S/2020/1172/SCR, with over 100 local residents making their voices heard by demanding that an EIA was essential. The Council echoed local concern by concluding that 'the proposed development would have the potential for significant environmental effects on landscape and visual impact.'

As a part of this process, the company are now engaging in a period of public consultation and have created a website detailing their plans which can be found at: https://www.copselodgesolar.co.uk/



JBM Solar insist that public opinion will be taken into account as they shape their Full Planning Application, so this is a vital chance to make local feeling known on the issue.

The closing date for comments to be made to JBM Solar is **5pm on 11<sup>th</sup> September.**

The halfway stop at the Greatworth Inn was much appreciated, particularly when some kind locals emptied their purses to provide a donation.


